

Kiewit Infrastructure West Co. Construction Manager Jeff Finochiaro explains the bridge improvements underway to accommodate the light rail:

Central Avenue at Salt River Bridge was closed over several weekends in June to accommodate a bridge retrofit, including the replacement of bearing pads. Concrete is stiff, so the pads allow the bridge to slightly jiggle and shift without cracking. (In a very imperfect analogy, think of it like a hip replacement.)

Kiewit's Jeff Finochiaro explained the high tech effort: "We have a combination of jacks under each of the 12 girders, controlled by two computers and hydraulics. The jacks will lift the bridge about three and a half inches, with anywhere from 5000 to 8000 psi, to replace the bearing pads. Once that work is done, we will replace the outside barriers, putting in new curbs and new handrail. Then, likely sometime in the fall, we will be able to install the light rail track on top of the bridge."

PHOENIX PARKS HIRING PHOENIX AFTERSCHOOL CENTER EMPLOYEES

The Parks and Recreation Department is currently seeking highly motivated, friendly, and outgoing individuals who enjoy and have experience in working with school age children. Current vacancies are in the Phoenix Afterschool Center (PAC) Program, work sites are located in schools throughout the City of Phoenix boundaries. Phoenix Afterschool Center (PAC) Program is an out-of-school time recreation program where school-age youth are provided a variety of age appropriate, developmental activities that are fun, stimulating, and enriching.

The PAC program runs through the public-school schedule 2022-2023 (present - May 2023). PAC experiences intermittent breaks due to school breaks and City holidays. When school is not in session, PAC is not in session (i.e. spring, fall, winter, and summer breaks). Hours vary by school site and are typically 2 p.m. - 6 p.m. and one day a week for early release, as early as 11:30 a.m.. Staff are required to attend monthly evening staff trainings.

Parks and Recreation Aides are entry level positions that perform recreation work. General assignments may include cleaning and setting up for special events; performing custodial work such as cleaning restrooms and sweeping floors; providing clerical support; helping with various recreation programs such as arts and crafts, dance classes, social events, group games, and physical and sporting events and instruction.

Recreation Instructors may develop, implement, and guide recreation activities and supervise children in sports programs, and/or recreation classes, assist with special events; and plan, schedule, and conduct recreation classes in activities such as arts and crafts, dance, drama, music, sports, and games; oversee programs, prepare facilities and, monitor activities.

Recreation Leaders perform recreation work in a lead capacity over Recreation Aides, Instructors, and volunteers or in charge of a facility or major program area. This position is responsible for providing various recreational programming at PAC sites. This includes management of programs and coverage of facilities as required and to ensure safety of all participants.

Phoenix Sky Harbor Debuts New Concourse

Visitors to the new Terminal 4 Eighth Concourse will be charmed with spectacular views, an array of national and local business and state-of-the art technology, like windows with electrochromic glazing that automatically adjust tint levels based on the sun's location.

The new concourse at Terminal 4 is a \$310 million, eight-gate project that adds 275,000- square-feet in space and serves Southwest Airlines.



The concourse, which is located on the southwest corner of the airport's busiest terminal, also adds 130,000-square-feet of excellent dining and retail options for travelers.

The concourse will feature new local shops and restaurants as well as a common use airport lounge. Local favorites Pedal Haus Brewery and Berry Divine – Acai Bowls will operate in the new concourse as well as regional concepts like Bobby's Burgers and Eegee's, and national chain Chick-Fil-A. Sip Coffee & Beer will also provide travelers with a number of local products from concepts such as Native Ground Coffee, Mother Road Brewing and Half Moon Empanadas.


Concessions will open in phases through 2023. Temporary kiosks are available for travelers.

In addition, the project includes a new transfer bridge connecting the south concourses to the north, which means travelers can easily connect between A and D gates.

And there's more good news for travelers.

The spacious, comfortable concourse features a variety of customer amenities, including access to charging stations in every seat, an Animal Relief Area, Family Restroom, Nursing room and hearing loop connectivity that allows those with hearing devices to connect to the PA system.

There are now five animal relief areas post-security in Terminal 3 and Terminal 4. There are also four dog parks at America's Friendliest Airport®: the Bone Yard (Terminal 4); the Paw Pad (Terminal 3); the Park and Bark (East Economy Lot); and the Park N Play (44th PHX Sky Train® Station).




Art lovers will also enjoy a massive art installation called "Phoenix Lights, Phoenix Rising" by Los Angeles artist Susan Logoreci. The immersive art project consists of a 30-foot by 300-foot terrazzo floor and 28 two-foot by three-foot airplane window shaped, terrazzo wall pieces. It is a captivating, progressive experience, taking the viewer from the city at night through sun drenched, local landscapes. Inspired by the notion of an aerial view, the floor depicts views of the Phoenix landscape.

BULK TRASH PLACEMENT

If you have curbside collection, crews will only pick up piles placed close to the edge of your property, which must be at least 5 feet away from fixed objects.



Do not place piles on top of water meters.

If you have alley collection, place pile along the alley wall. Avoid touching wall and blocking alley access.



IMPORTANT SERVICE DATES

Note these changes:

Service is not provided on the following dates. Every collection day moves one day later.

- Thanksgiving Day (Nov. 25, 2021)
- Christmas Day (Dec. 25, 2021)
- New Year's Day (Jan. 1, 2022)
- * Thanksgiving Day is on a Thursday, therefore, collection will occur on Friday. Friday will occur on Saturday.

Regular pickup:

The city works a regular collection schedule on:

- Christmas Eve
- New Year's Eve
- Martin Luther King Jr. Day
- Presidents' Day
- Cesar Chavez Day
- Memorial Day
- Independence Day
- Labor Day
- Veterans Day

DO:

- Follow the dates for bulk trash placement.
- Sweep or rake area after collection, if necessary.
- Securely bag or box all grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings before placing out for bulk trash.
- Cut tree trimmings down to less than 12" in diameter and 4' in length.
- ✓ Place broken down cardboard in your recycle container.

DON'T INCLUDE:

- More than 20 cubic yards in your pile, which is similar to the size of a SUV.
- O Loose grass, leaves, weeds, twigs and hedge clippings.
- Nousehold hazardous waste (HHW), such as antifreeze, pool chemicals, oil, batteries and paint.
- Name or size.
- Nappliances that use refrigerants.
